

Impaired charge won't affect my performance - Day

Chastened, but with forthrightness, Georgetown and Halton Councillor John Day announced at Town Council on Tuesday that his recent arrest for impaired driving will not affect his performance as a municipal councillor.

The September 11th charges of impaired driving and driving with over 80 milligrams of alcohol in 100-millitres of blood, laid by Whitby OPP on the 401 in Clarington, put the

brakes on Day's current provincial aspirations.

Last Wednesday he withdrew as the Liberal party candidate for Halton in the next provincial election and on Thursday he submitted his resignation as a member of the Halton Police Services Board.

Reading from a prepared statement on Tuesday, Day, 55, said he wanted to make it clear he was not on municipal business when arrested.

He said out of respect for the integrity of the Halton Continued on Page 2





Council delays date for smoking ban

Delaying a public meeting on proposed tougher smoking rules until January throws off a timetable recommended by the Town's smoking stakeholder committee for Halton Hills to go 100 per cent smoke-free in public and work places by 2003.

When staff pointed out the delay, requested on Tuesday by the local hospitality industry until after its busy holiday season, would push back target dates to further restrict and then ban smoking, councilors voted to remove all mention of dates in the report.

Scott Roach, owner of Boston Pizza in Georgetown told councillors

the industry needs more time to prepare for the public meeting on the stakeholder's report, which he feels will bring out all sides of the debate, but not accomplish much because a federal or provincial policy is the only fair way to regulate smoking, if it is to be regulated.

Councillor Clark Acton Somerville asked Roach if he had statistics to show what a smoking ban does to business and Roach, a non-smoker, said he had "truck fulls" from national and provincial restaurant and hospitality associations.

"I'm scared if these changes are made that I will lose my business...," Roach said, adding Halton Hill is a "tough gig" for the

hospitality industry.

He said that across Canada, crackdowns and bans on smoking in bars and restaurants are taking 50 to 60 per cent out of some businesses, adding they aren't at council to advocate smoking, but to protect their livelihoods.

All councillors except Georgetown's Moya Johnson, supported delaying the public forum until January. Johnson wanted a report back early in the New Year detailing the Town's strategy to become smoke free by July 2003.

After Council delayed the public meeting on the stakeholder's recomendations, CAO Steve An-
