Dawkins ask storm pond relief

Council won't exempt Acton East developer Fred Dawkins from a new policy for storm water pond maintenance, but will help try to recover some of his extra costs from Effort Trust, the plaza developer adjacent to Dawkins' subdivision on the south side of Highway 7, east of Churchill Road.

At a recent meeting Dawkins, asked politicians and staff to use "equity and logic" and apply the old pond fee of \$20,000, not \$79,254 calculated by the new policy.

Dawkins said while Effort Trust helped pay for use of the pond, he's also now also having to pay their \$12,000 share as fixed by the new policy, and asked Council for a break.

Georgetown Councillor -Jane Fogal said it was unfair to charge the whole maintenance fee to Dawkins and let Effort Trust "off."

"Maybe that's our problem, that portion, and we should eat that," Fogal said.

Calling for "fairness" Acton Councillor Rick Bonnette suggested drawing down on an existing letter of credit from Effort held by the Town to pay for its proportionate share of the new policy cost.

"Get a legal opinion. I think we owe it to the developer," Bonnette said, adding he didn't think Council has the " stomach" to waive the entire \$59,254 difference, but there had to be some relief because, "there's a lot of principle involved."

The female cashier grabbed what she thought was all of the cash back from the man, who then fled the store. A check found her till \$570 short.


The suspect is 178-centimetres tall, 77-kilograms with black hair and a goatee. He was wearing a black pin-striped suit and speaks poor English.
