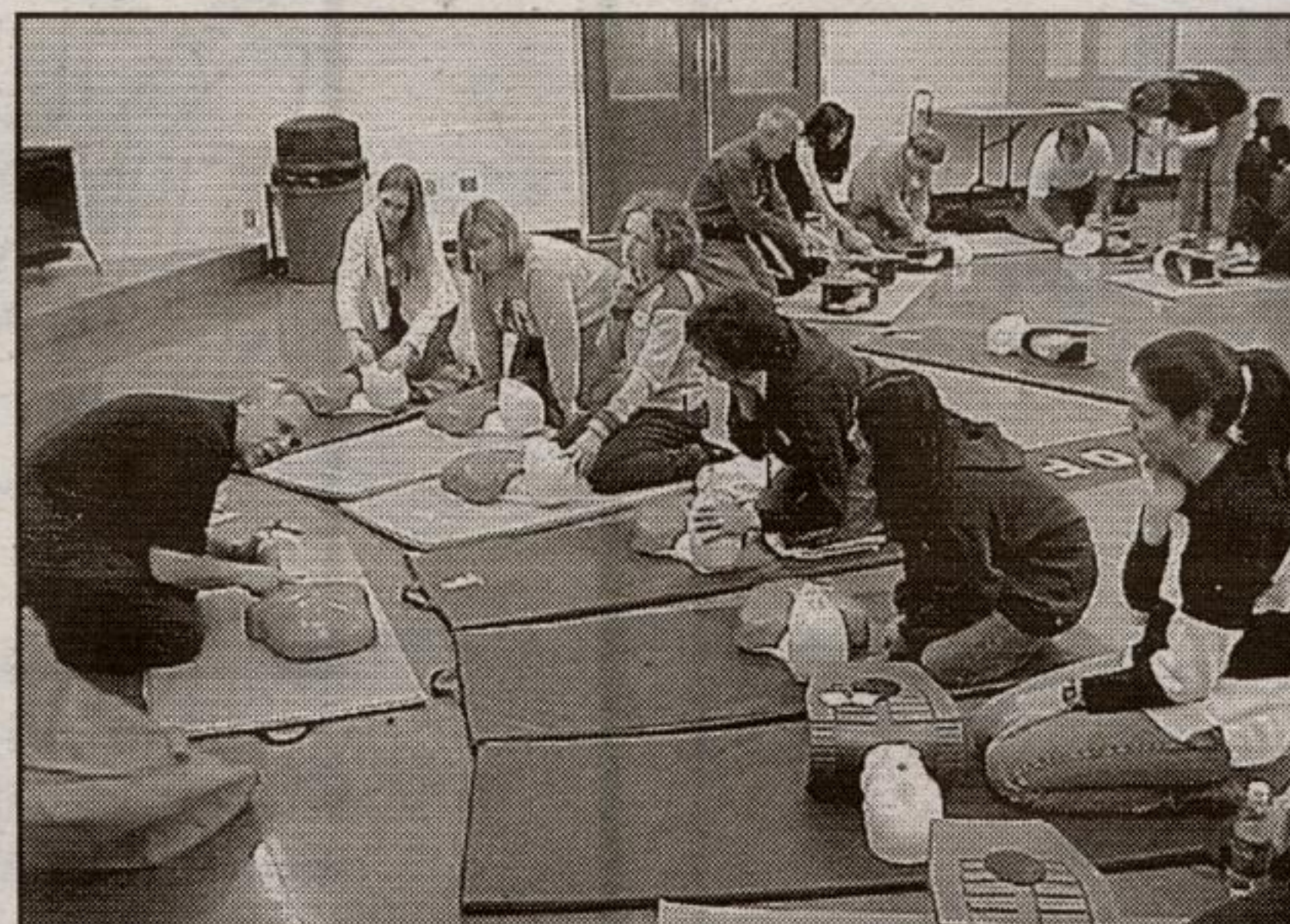
Twenty-five year pins were presented to Mrs. Leo Smith, Janet Marshall and Ronnie Lampkin.
