However, to get a permit for use of the park, Halton Hills Parks and Recreation requires \$80.00 for the park, \$217.50 for the use of the Boat House (\$21.75 per hour), parking at Robert Little School \$278.20 (\$27.82 per hour) and a mandatory insurance policy of \$2 million.

"We believe the expenses will be covered," Jack says. "but it has made it more difficult. Once the final approvals are in we can move


