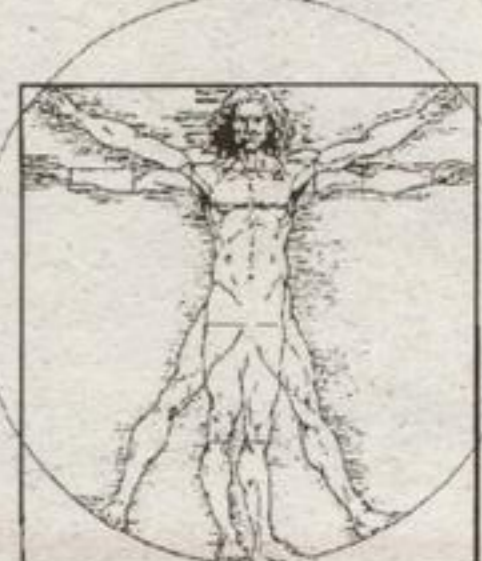

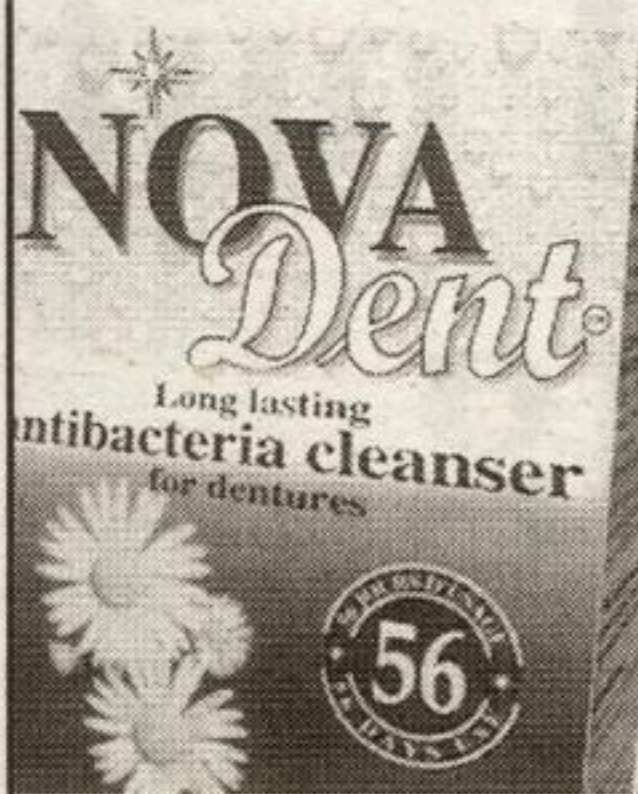

public transportation system although there was an evident need for one. "It's a noble idea," said mayoralty candidate Rick Bonnette but private business would have already filled the void if it was feasible.

There was an aversion to being part of the GTA's urban sprawl and to water from Lake Ontario. Council candidate Mike O'Leary proposed to find out what was being done about the

lack of water, if any, in Acton. He said Shoppers Drug's proposal for a large drug store in Acton and accompanying 50 to 60 jobs was being held up, when it wouldn't use any more water than two houses.

Sean Haefner declared he wants his children to grow up in this small town, with a quality of life like the Acton he grew up in. Mayoralty candidate Marilyn Serjeantson said if she's elected mayor she would attempt to preserve the unique flavour of Halton Hills.

John Day, a candidate for mayor, said he was a consensus builder and would see the community had a master plan and secondary plan that reflected the community's values. He also said he vowed to see Acton had full equality in Halton Hills.

Rick Bonnette noted he had spearheaded the drive to keep Halton Hills Hydro in Acton and listed accomplishments that had

occurred, that he had been actively engaged in, such as the new arena, new fire hall, new ambulance station with 24 Hour service and the project for a community sports field/park now in the works. He cited his 21 years of experience on council.

Incumbent Kathy Gastle said she had tried hard to serve all the communities in Halton Hills and tried to raise the town's standards by updating bylaws. She pointed to major road im-

provements in Acton and the recent \$6,000 she had raised in the mayor's golf tournament which was presented to Heritage Acton. She said council had kept taxes down during her administration and she felt her vision for Halton Hills would benefit Acton both in new business and as a good place to be.

The question period included a reference to the mayor's chain of office which was recently purchased for \$10,000 an expense the questioner thought was unwarranted. Mayor Gastle replied the old pewter chain of office was worn out and undecipherable. It could not be fixed, she said, so with the full consent of council she purchased a new, more serviceable one.

The smoking ban, always a controversial subject, was discussed. John Day said now a new government was in charge at Queen's Park it should make a province-wide level playing field. Rick Bonnette noted he had written three recommendations to the Province to pass province-wide regulations to make it a level playing field and they had been ignored.

There was much discussion on other topics during the two hour session which ended over the coffee cups. Most in attendance agreed the meeting had been informative and entertaining as well and thanked the seniors and Rotary Club for organizing it.

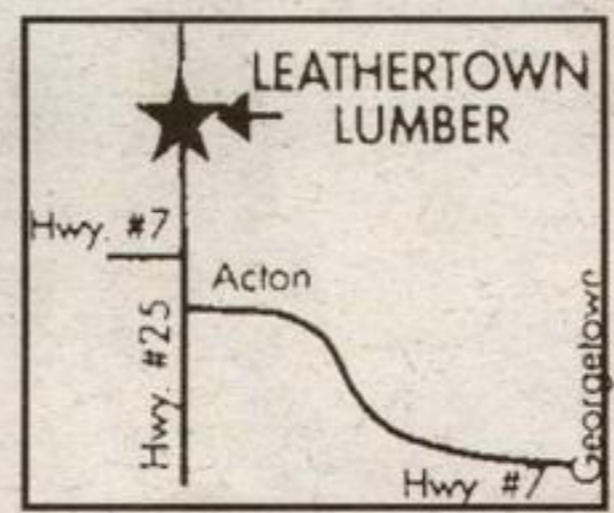
