• SAMUEL DE CHAMPLAIN, THE FRENCH EXPLORER WHO FOUNDED THE CITY OF QUEBEC, DIES.

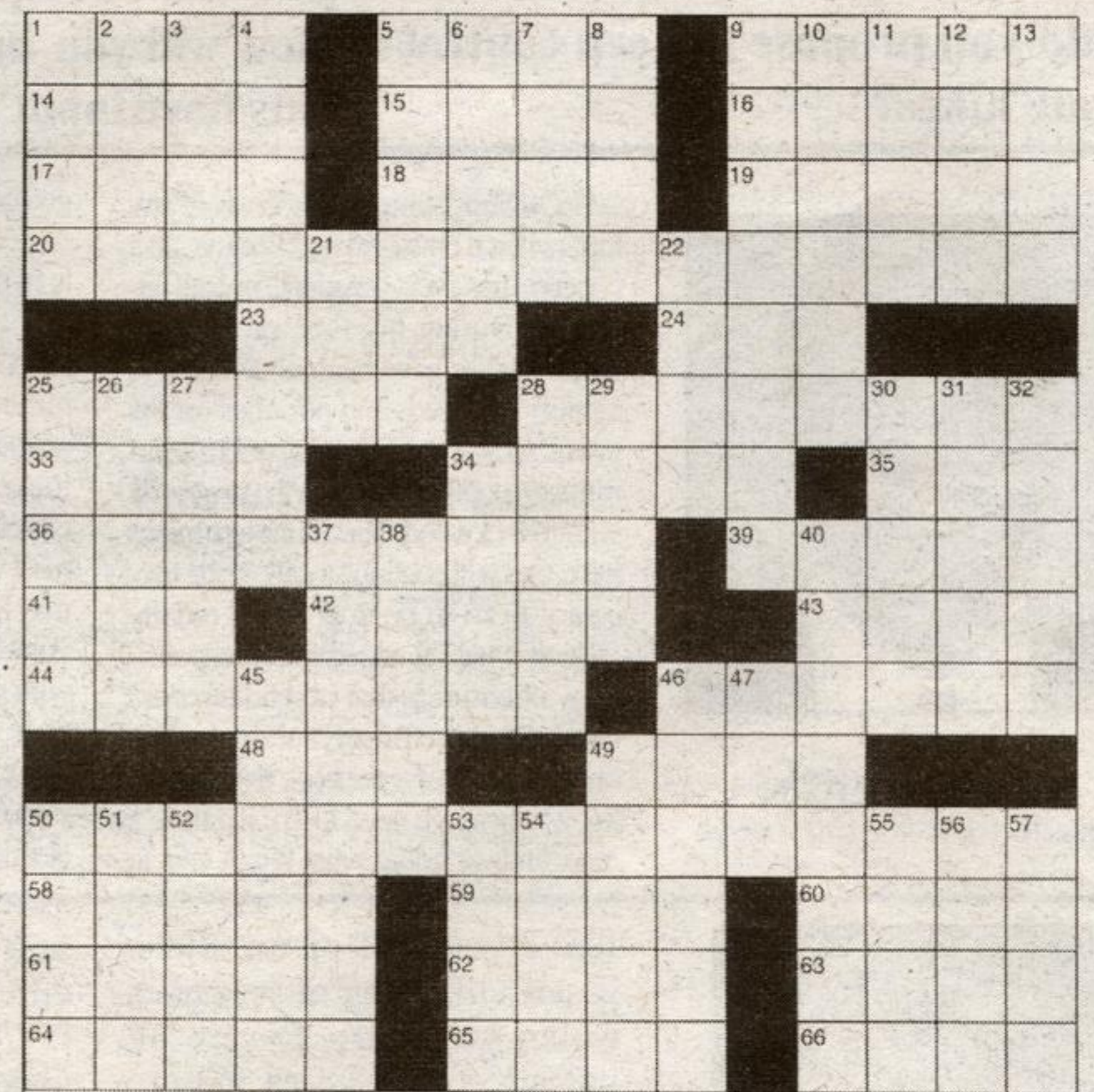
