The hot, loud, crowded reality of the Third World hit Acton's Amy Yateman like a blast as she, and a group of local Rotarians, walked outside the airport in New Delhi, India last month.

Yateman, owner of Starlight Café on Mill Street, was a volunteer with Rotary's PolioPlus program that delivers life-saving vaccine to impoverished countries.

Acton Rotarians Rob Charette and the Reverend Emrys Jenkins, and Charette's 19year-old old son Jason, helping Rotary reach its goal of a polio-free world by 2005.

"I was not prepared at all for the reality - the beggars and children lying all over the steps at the airport - but I adapted quickly because we were so accepted and welcomed wherever we went," Yateman said on Friday.


When they weren't dispens-

She was travelling with ing oral doses of polio vaccine from an eyedropper in rural villages, Yateman said they toured the country, including a visit to the Taj Mahal, where there were "tons of tourists."

Yateman, who describes herself as a friend to Acton Rotary Club members, several of whom are her regular customers, was surprised how much their polio fighting efforts were appreciated.

"We were almost like gods in their eyes for some reason -

Purpose: As part of the five-year review of its Official Plan, Halton Regional Council adopted a set of 76 directions in June 2003 as the basis for making changes to the Plan, including:

- A firm urban boundary to accommodate growth to year 2021.
- Enhanced policies to increase the supply of affordable housing.
- Programs to support the long-term viability of Halton's agricultural industry.
- An updated and expanded greenlands system.
- Commitments to improving air and water quality.
- New thrusts to promote travel by public transit, cycling and walking.

These directions have now been incorporated into the Plan in the form of Proposed Amendment No. 25. The public is invited to the following open houses to obtain more information and to provide comments on the proposed amendment.




