Town gearing up for business

Halton Hills is "gearing up for business" with a new can-do attitude to help attract new industry and commerce to town.

That was the main message delivered to local business leaders by Halton Hills Mayor Rick Bonnette at the annual Mayor's Christmas lunch, hosted by the Halton Hills Chamber of Commerce, at the North Halton Golf and Country Club last Thursday.

After recounting some of the high and low points of his first whirlwind year in office - a grueling budget, a crisis with the announced closure of the obstetrics unit at Georgetown hospital and completion of an ambitious strategic plan

Bonnette predicted a bright future.


"I said last year that we would be a town that would compete with other municipalities in attracting industry and a commercial base," Bonnette told the sold-out crowd of approximately 150 people.

He said the town is hearing up for businesses with a creative and imaginative council and staff and co-operative business community, an attitude highlighted by a recent deal among politicians,

in January 2005. There was no winner of the land owners and developers to bring services to the 401 prestige industrial corridor in south Halton Hills, six to eight years earlier than planned.

"Last year, I said it is one thing to say we're open for business, but it's another thing to say we are prepared for business.

"I think now it is safe to say we are gearing up for business gearing up for major action in the 401-407 gateway Business Park," Bonnette said adding they have a "new attitude and we're out to help industry."

The mayor said there will no longer be holdups for developers applying for necessary building permits as they continue to "think out of the box" for new creative solutions to challenges.

Bonnette pointed out that just prior to Halton approving high development charges, the Town's was swamped with 273 building permit applications on one weekend - and they were dealt with quickly showing "it can be done."

To deal with the continued shortage of family physicians in Halton Hills, and particularly Acton that has the most acute need in the Region, Bonnette announced formation of a new Halton Hills Physician Recruitment Committee.

Appointed members so far include Chamber president Norm Paget, former Acton Councillor Norm Elliott, Georgetown businessman Paul Auty, Dr. Jeff Sutherland, Graeme Goebelle and a rep from the Acton Legion.

"We have real shortage (of doctors), if not a crisis, in

Acton," Bonnette said, adding Georgetown has a shortage of office space for new physicians.

As for the coming year, Bonnette promised that he would not mislead the public with indecision and his door will always be open to new ideas and suggestions.
