



Protection of natural areas provides best dollar value

Research sponsored by Ducks Unlimited Canada (DUC) and the Nature Comservancy of Canada (NCC) indicates that natural areas within settled regions of Canada provide goods and services with potential to hold a higher economic value than the current market value of the land.

Four Canadian sites were chosen as case studies including the Grand River Watershed in Ontario, Southern Ontario's largest watershed which encompasses this area with the Eramosa River and Blue Springs Creek. Others were in B.C., Manitoba, P.E.I. and Saskatchewan.

"We can now start to place a dollar value on the benefits of protecting natural areas and we can also measure the cost of losing these areas," says Jim Anderson DUC's Ontario policy advisor.

When natural areas are degraded or destroyed, society loses benefits such as:

*good quality surface and groundwater, as well as reducing the potential for floods.

*the ability to reduce water and waste treatment costs.

*aesthetic and recreational opportunities.

*protecting agricultural

production on lands threatened by urbanization.

*the ability to decrease net greenhouse gas emissions.

*the ability to improve air quality by protecting forests and reducing urban sprawl.

Environmentally healthy land in the Grand River Watershed might be worth up to \$343 per hectare in benefits to the local economy. The Grand River case study indicates that the value of this "natural capital" closely parallels rental rates for agricultural lands, which range from \$73/ha to \$247.10/ha. The net benefits from conserving the natural features of land range from a low estimate of \$79.91/ha to a high estimate of \$342.76, exceeding the market value. The Grand River watershed takes in 7,000 square kilometers.

"The intent of this information is not to place the conservation community at odds with agriculture," insists Anderson. "It's just the opposite: now that we can attach a value to environmental goods and services, it is our hope that producers and other landowners might be compensated now, and in the long run, for their stewardship efforts."
