



## Acton man in Thailand helps with Asian relief

Acton's Scott Mac-Donald slept through the earthquake and tsunami that devastated Southeast Asia, only learning of the disaster from his parents in a middle of the night telephone call to the mission school in Thailand where he teaches.

"We called him right away - thank goodness for cell phones - and we woke him up actually. He hadn't felt the earthquake and he turned on the local news and there was nothing on it about the earthquake," said Scott's dad, Peter MacDonald, on Monday.

Scott phoned his parents back four or five hours later to say that they were bringing some of the survivors to his area and it was "pretty bad."

After three or four days officials asked for volunteers to go to the coastal areas of Thailand to help with relief efforts; Scott volunteered and was
