Committee committed to bringing new doctors to Acton, Georgetown

The acute lack of medical doctors in Acton has galvanized Halton Hills Council to redouble efforts to get physicians to locate here.

_Saying "the time is now for extraordinary efforts," Mayor Rick Bonnette has struck a Physician Recruitment & Retention Committee for the Town of Halton Hills. Comprised of interested members of the community, Councillors, the medical profession and the Chamber of Commerce, the committee will reinforce the efforts of regional staff in recruiting new doctors to Halton Hills. All four members of council from Acton are on the committee.

"We need new family physicians to service the growing needs of our community. In Acton, the situation is critical with 10,000 people being serviced with only three doctors, two of them part-time" Bonnette noted. "Georgetown

In 2004, grants were awarded to projects in Bangladesh, India, Haifa and the North of Israel, as well as Jamaica.

also remains underserviced, and our efforts will continue to recruit additional doctors for that part of our community," Bonnette added.

The committee is broken into three working groups who report back monthly. One group is looking to improve the quality of promotional and tour efforts. A CD-ROM is in production that will be sent to interested medical professionals.

"Not only do we have fine working facilities, like our hospital and long-term health care centre, but we enjoy a superior quality of life," Bonnette added.

"Halton Hills affords rural splendour while still only 45 minutes from cosmopolitan centres and world-class research facilities in the Greater Toronto Area universities and major medical facilities. We will show touring medical professionals why Halton Hills is a superior location to settle and raise a family, something we already know.

The Capital Campaign & Facilities Subcommittee is

looking in to the question of professional medical office space in Acton and Georgetown. Both centres need upgrading or replacing and lack of facilities is an obvious impediment in attracting new physicians to Acton.

Various models across the province are being explored.

The Incentives & Publicity Subcommittee is looking at options, which may be offered to doctors to make our community more attractive. These can be as simple as food and lodging for weekend visits to more tangible incentives in return for a commitment to stay in the community for a specific period of time. When necessary, the Subcommittee will coordinate fundraising events and keep the public apprised as to the progress of the entire group.

"Recruiting is a community issue, not just a doctor, hospital or town staff issue," Bonnette told the committee when beginning this initiative. The mayor encourages those with ideas or contributions to become involved in this cause. "We must compete with many towns and cities for new family physicians", Mayor Bonnette said. "This challenge will remain a priority for your Council until such time as we recruit enough new doctors to care for the physical and mental health of all our citizens. I encourage your participation."
