**Township Receives Drinking Water Report** 

Guelph/Eramosa council received an annual report on the drinking water system from the Ontario Ministry of the Environment. Parameters measured included microbiological (such as E.Coli bacteria), inorganic (such as mercury and lead), and organic (such as DDT and benzene). In this case, organic does not mean pesticide-free. The scientific use of organic means "a chemical compound containing carbon". Some of these chemicals are found in pesticides, such as diazinon or DDT. The standard of allowable levels is provincially legislated. For the three Rockwood wells, all parameters were within the allowable limits except sodium. Lead was higher than half of the allowable limit.

Council member David McCrae asked if a representative from the Ontario Clean Water Agency, which tests the water supply, could explain findings to council. Mayor Martin and Councillor Chris White agreed with the suggestion.

> Property Value to be Appealed

As a result of the newly enacted by-law regarding County Wellington's role in tax assessment appeals, the county submitted a property for appeal to Guelph/Eramosa council. Council unanimously authorized the appeal to the Assessment Review Board (ARB) regarding an incorrectly assessed property. The property in question is a planned subdivision. There was a Plan of Subdivision registered in early November 2004 with Land Titles. MPAC (Municipal Property Assessment Corporation) did not process this plan before the tax roll cut off date, which was November 26. MPAC assessed the property as one lot but then added 39 lots on December 7, 2004. As a result, the Township has lost

voices not only critical of urban sprawl but offering solutions. While it has been stated that in the developed world buildings consume half the energy we generate and contribute half the CO2 emissions, Charles maintains that "by far the greater problem is the sprawling, highly subsidised patterns of development which are totally unsustainable environmentally and fiscally". This is leading him back to a renewed interest in his second profession of planning.

"So much NIMBYism arises from a fear of greater densities, and yet some of the most sublime and livable environments are surprisingly compact" he adds. Whether in central cities or rural villages, he intends to place an increasing emphasis in his work on illustrating that more sustainable development patterns can also be more affordable and attractive.
