ings." People do not realize how quickly their world can be turned upside down in a matter of seconds." Take added precautions to minimize the risk of fire and subsequent tragedies that could follow," he advises.

Safety tips for the care of your family Christmas tree offered by Fire Services include:

1. Diagonally cut 2-3" off the base of the tree before placing into the stand.

2. Check and add water on a daily basis.

3. Keep the tree away from floor heaters, fireplaces and other sources of heat.

4. Use only CSA-Listed lights marked for indoor

5. Unplug the lights before going out or going to bed.
