
Furnace problems

rollticians announce wish lists

Many Halton Hills councillors and Halton Peel MP Julian Reed share wishes of health and happiness for Halton Hills residents in 1995, and they also have a few other wishes they would like to see realized in the coming year.

Mayor Marilyn Serjeantson said her biggest wish for the region is a zero tax increase.

"It will be a tough haul, but I also wish for no tax increases for the town," said Serjeantson. "It would be nice to clear up any lawsuits that are hanging around." She added that will allow council to get back to the business of running the town smoothly.

The three Acton councillors share the same wishes for 1995.

"I want to see development go ahead in east Acton and the initial start of the arena," said Gerald Rennie. He added the plans for the arena should be drawn up in 1995, and built in 1996, but if it is possible he would like to see building start this year.

"I am hoping for good news and common sense from the Ontario Municipal Board so we will get a green light on development in Acton east," said Norm Elliott. He added he would like to see unrestricted growth there which would open the doors for the new arena to be built.

"I hope to see the water audit come through so Acton can develop," said Rick Bonnette. "And the arena can come along with it. I hope we can come in with a zero per cent increase on the town portion of the budget."

Ward 2 councillor Bill Robson said he is hoping for an upswing in the economy and "less downloading from the province."

"I would like to see the south end of Georgetown completed," said Ward 4 councillor Keith Bottomley. "We need more recreation areas."

Ward 4 councillor Ron Chatten said he would like to see "lots of public participation in the budget process to help with setting priorities." He added he hopes for a zero tax increase for residents.

"I hope the economy keeps rolling so businesses in the community will continue to do well." He would also like to see progress and a resolution to the Equity lawsuit.

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
