

"People want to buy something because it looks nice, but they don't know what it is about," Patricia said. "I can tell them the history and meaning behind the paintings, especially since I know the individual artists."

The store is open Monday to Friday 9:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. and Saturdays 10 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., or by appointment. Native crafts, such as beadwork and dream catchers, are taught at the store.

Pat Coe and her husband Peter opened their small business, The Cookie Jar back in 1984 in half of an industrial unit on Mountainview Rd. in Georgetown.

Eleven years later the company, now called The Terra Cotta Cookie Co. Ltd., spans two units, 4,000 sq. ft., in the same complex. The company has 23 full and part-time employees and supplies fresh baked cookies, dough, muffin batter and other products to 500 schools in the Golden Horseshoe area.

Pat decided to start the company as a result of her son's allergies to additives in food. She found there were few foods he could eat, including cookies, because of all the artificial ingredients. "I figured there must be other

kids that have the same problem as he did," said Pat.

Terra Cotta Cookie products are made with all natural, pure ingredients and baked the way Grandma used to. "I developed the cookie recipes myself from scratch." The company sells eight different kinds of cookies including chocolate chip (the most popular), peanut butter, and oatmeal raisin.

Terra Cotta Cookie Co. has recently launched a fundraising program. School kids and community organizations sell Terra Cottas' scoop and bake cookie dough and muffin batter to raise money.
