Grant money to study future arena uses

Halton North MPP Noel Duignan presented a cheque for \$5,000 to Janis Fread, president of Acton Agricultural Society on Friday.

The money is a first installment on a \$10,000 grant towards paying for a study of possible future uses of the arena in Prospect Park. Total cost of the study will be about \$20,000, with the rest of the funding from in-kind donations and cash from the University of Guelph, the society's arena committee, and the society itself.

Through the study, to be completed by October this year, the Acton Agricultural Society will assess taking over the arena, establish a marketing and business plan and consider using the facility for a year-round farmers' market, monthly auction sales and things like small trade shows.
