# Schafer for Raiders

Gerry Schafer wants to put the Georgetown Raiders back on a winning hockey tradition. As the Junior A club's new head coach, he'll have the opportunity to do just that.

General Manager Jules Russiani announced Tuesday evening that former assistant Schafer would take over as the team's skipper.

While the announcement was made just this week, the decision was made three weeks ago - just prior to the Raiders' spring training camp. Schafer, who beat out eight other candidates for the position, becomes the fifth Raider head coach in four years.

"I like Gerry's way of thinking, and his ideas for this hockey club," said Russiani, "The other candidates weren't telling me the same things Gerry was."

Schafer, a 39-year-old Port Credit native, came to Georgetown mid-way through the 1994-95 season - following a brief stint as head coach with the Metro League's Bramalea Blues.

"I have to be honest, I was unhappy with the setup in Bramalea. I think this (the Raiders) is

the right situation for me now because of the great people I'll be working with and the challenge to bring Georgetown back to a winning tradition, that goes back to when I was 10years-old," explained Schafer.

Along with his head coaching position with the Blues, Schafer spent two years as assistant under GERRY SCHAFER Jim Platt with the East's

Markham Waxers, a year as head coach of the Durham Huskies of the OHA Senior A league

and two years with the Provincial Junior A's Dixie Beehives. As a player, Gerry spent four seasons with the Dixie Beehives before receiving a hockey

scholarship to Northern Michigan University. Following that, he was part of the Georgetown Raiders - but was injuredprior to the team's Hardy Cup drive in 1982.

"I think what makes me the right person for the job is a combination of my experience and contacts with the NCAA, OHL and in the Metro Area in general. People in local circles recognize me as a dedicated hockey personwho wants to help players improve and advance to higher levels of hockey."

He describes his goals for the club's improvement with a simple two-year plan.

"I expect this club to win 20 games in 1995-96, and finish fifth (or better). The following Tummonds, Chris Letts, Brandon season we'll be competing for the Centennial Cup."




## Athletes of the Week
