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On the Tee

Swingweight

Swingweight is a concept talked about by many golfers but understood by few. Essentially, the measurement of swingweight is a means of matching one club to the others in the set so that they all feel the same in the player's hands...

When golfers pick up a club in a pro shop or from a friend, they will usually give it a waggle or two and quickly form an opinion about its feel or heft. It may feel comfortable or it may seem to be either too heavy or too light in the head. These impressions are subjective measurements of swingweight.

Swingweight is a ratio of the amount of weight in the clubhead compared to the rest of the club. The current system of measuring swingweight was devised by an engineer, Robert Adams, in 1923. His method assessed the headweight required to balance the club horizontally on a fulcrum located 14 inches from the butt end of the grip. This was expressed as a relationship, not an absolute amount. Adams designated the different ratios as combinations of the letters A to E and the number 0 to 9 (for example D1 or C8).

Because swingweight is a ratio dealing with the distribution of weight within the club, one should not think that a club with the swingweight D3 is heavier than a C7. All this means is that the D3 club has a greater proportion of its weight in the clubhead than the C7.

Most men's clubs are in the range of C8 to D2. Women's clubs are usually between C2 and C8. Unless you have very sensitive hands, you will probably not be able to detect a difference of 3 or 4 points between clubs. If you are concerned or curious about the swingweight of your clubs, have them checked. If there are large differences from club to club, you may want to have the swingweights adjusted. Otherwise, don't worry about it.

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
