
Inter-county victory

The results were impressive, with the beginners team finishing third overall despite being penalized for not having the required number of swimmers and the advanced team finishing seventh.

The second goal will be accomplished this Sunday after weeks and weeks of preparation.

"I expected absolute chaos," says Edwards of the lead-up to the show. "Most of the girls haven't done anything like it before."

However, like most of

the year's other happenings, things have slowly come together and the club's 24 members are set to show off their stuff to parents, interested members of the community and some special guests.

The plan has worked. The proof is in the reaction from some of those involved in the club.


"We've gotten some very positive feedback from parents and that's been one of the most rewarding aspects," says Candy Wolter, who handles the club's finances.

Once the show on Sunday wraps up, the club will look forward to its second year, beginning in late summer.


Edwards says she hopes to take club members to more competitions, but she stresses that the girls are not forced to take part.


Athletes of the Week
