Some of the best Canadian women golfers will be in Acton this week for the ninth annual Sawmill Creek Wines CPGA Women's Championship.

The tournament, featuring a field of more than 50 professionals from across Canada and the United States including several from the LPGA tour, will be held at the Blue

Nancy Harvey, a native of Saskatchewan and LPGA tour player, returns to defend her title.

Harvey and Greatrex will be challenged by three other LPGA veterans.

Karin Mundinger of Toronto has been on the LPGA tour for a decade. Prior to joining the tour, the 35-year-old Mundinger won six collegiate titles while attending Ohio State University. She has won close to \$60,000 in her LPGA career.

Matt Brain crowned Ontario champion

Ten different events over two days. Throw in some unfavorable weather conditions and you have the perfect recipe for a gruelling decathlon.

Matt Brain overcame those hurdles recently to claim first in the decathlon at the Ontario junior track and field championships.

"It was really sweltering and humid. Because of the heat, it was exhausting," says the 18-year-old Georgetown resident, adding that the conditions forced competitors to abandon any hope of achieving high scores and instead focus on just placing well.


As it turned out, Brain was the best at following that strategy, but it wasn't without some rough moments.

In the opening event, the 100 metres, he got off to a poor start and found himself trailing badly in the point totals. It brought back memories from last year, when Brain had to pull out of the competition due to a hip injury suffered in the 100 metres.

However, this time he was determined to rebound. "I slowly

creeped my way back," he says. "I finally pulled into first after the ninth event."

From there, he hung on for the win and guaranteed himself a trip to British Columbia for the Canadian junior

championships later this month.

It could also lead to another, more exotic voyage. The top two in B.C. will advance to the junior Pan-American championships in Chile in early September.

"The fact that Brian has made it this far is quite an accomplishment and a testament to his athletic ability.

In Georgetown, training facilities for a decathlete are not ideal. But, the Guelph track club member makes the best of it.

"I just try and keep my strength and fundamentals up," he says, explaining the he runs each day and lifts weights three times a week.

A week before important meets, he heads to York University to work on specific events, such as the pole vault. Even at York, he works with little or no coaching supervision.

It is that type of work ethic that helped land Brain an athletic scholarship at Sam Houston State University in Texas. With the coaching and facilities available at the school, he can see himself "getting a jump on my point totals" and improving in the track events, an admitted weakness.
