BENEFITS OF A HEALTHY LAWN

Beyond beauty, a healthy lawn performs many hidden tasks. A healthy lawn or sports field provides a much safer place for children to play. When children fall, the potential for injury is much greater on a hard, thin lawn than it is on a soft, lush lawn.

Up to 90% of the weight of a grass plant is in its roots. This root mass along with soil microbes helps to purify water before entering underground aquifers. Acting as as filter, it captures and breaks down many types of pollutants found in our water. Thick dense lawns can also absorb rainfall six times more effectively than a wheat or hay field, thus preventing erosion and runoff.

Turfgrass has the ability to trap millions of tons of pollutants released into the air each year. This natural process helps to keep the air we breathe cleaner.

Noise is a very common problem along highways. Grass slopes on two sides of a highway can reduce noise by up to 10 decibels. This reduction in noise can make living near a busy highway more tolerable. The air temperature around a home or building surrounded by pavement or con-

crete is likely to be a 6° to 8° warmer than the air around a structure surrounded by a healthy lawn. This cooling effect of grass will keep your home cooler, and may help reduce your energy costs for air conditioning. One of the most important benefits of a healthy lawn is something that you need

every day, would die without it, and it costs you nothing...AIR. Like trees, grass absorbs carbon dioxide which it needs to grow and survive. As a result, oxygen is produced which we all know is essential for our growth and survival. These are just a few of the many benefits that a healthy lawn can provide.
