An acclamation again this time just won't do!


We hope to see several names on the ballot when the October 23 byelection date rolls around, giving the people the opportunity to exercise their right to vote.

The people deserve the chance to decide who will represent them — and their children.


At present, no one has come forward and indicated that they will seek the position.

Did you know?

So much for 'common sense'

Perhaps I was naive or too trusting.

You see, I was skeptical back in June, when the Mike Harris Tories were elected to power on the promise of a "common sense" approach to government.

I don't say I believed them, because politicians are, well, politicians.

But after they took hold of the reins at Queen's Park, I had to admit, I was genuinely surprised to see numerous cuts to funding, in an effort to alleviate that dreaded deficit.

I began to wonder if Harris was actually going to deliver. Maybe this "common sense" thing was going to become a reality.

Welfare payments were reduced to able-bodied individuals, infrastructure money was cut on certain projects, and a host of costcutting measures were kicked into gear.

The whole atmosphere of the provincial government was suddenly looking very financially responsible.

Until this week.

That's when the Harris government announced they would restore out-of-country health care coverage to \$400 a day in time for snowbirds to head to the sunny south this winter.

So much for "common sense."

Correct me if I'm wrong, but if someone is in the financial situation able to afford to head south for six months, to pay 30 per cent exchange on their money and maintain two residences, one in the south and another in Canada, why, pray tell, do they need to be subsidized for


their six month winter vacation?

This one really annoys me. If Harris wanted to maintain some form of credibility, he sure took a wrong turn this

And by restoring this coverage, he has just bumped up the costs of medicare to the province by \$20 million, according to the figures released by the Bob Rae government, when the coverage was cut to \$100 a day in the first place.

And who will be picking up the tab for this \$20-million? Who else?

The middle and low income earners, who can't



afford to head south, but must stay in a snowbound Canada, working all winter, trying to make ends meet.

In a story in the Toronto Star, Jack Parry, president of the Canadian Snowbird Association, says seniors are only getting back what was originally theirs.

Parry maintains the saving for the over-60 couple will be about \$150, the cost of extended health coverage insurance.

A measly \$150? They would pay that in exchange on their Canadian dollars in a

few days. Meanwhile we pick up the tab as our kids, future taxpayers of the province, are having difficulty meeting the financial demands of acquiring a higher education.

Or how about the "other" seniors, the ones who can't afford any vacations for either financial or health reasons, who must watch as health care programs are reduced or even eliminated at home because funding has been cut.

How many programs like seniors' day care or at home care have been shelved as a result of funding?

Believe me, lots.

And seeing the province dole out \$20-million so a few hundred thousand seniors can work on their tan does nothing but infuriate me.

Parry says half of his group have annual incomes of less than \$30,000. I would really like to see where he gets his figures.

After all, how does someone in the under \$30,000 a year bracket afford to head south every winter, let alone own or rent a second residence?

Nope, I would be more inclined to believe the bulk of snowbirds are financially well heeled, certainly able to cough up an additional \$150 to cover themselves for the winter months.

Yup, I guess I was naive. The Tories are back to their old tricks, looking after their high income folks, while placing the burden on the little guys.

But as the old saying goes; The rich get richer,

and poor get poorer. And now, "common sense" is officially gone.
