Board looks at pensions for funding

Who can a board turn to nowadays to finance new schools?

Teachers, says Burlington Catholic school trustee Jim Sherlock.

"We need money to build schools and they have money and need places to invest it in," said Sherlock at a recent meeting of the Halton Roman Catholic School Board.

The money he was referring to exists in teachers' pension funds. Sherlock said the provincial teachers' pension fund has nearly doubled in the past few years to \$35 billion.

Meanwhile, boards need financing for new schools, but the provincial government cannot afford to supply it. Sherlock said Ontario school boards seek \$2 billion a year for capital projects and only receive \$325 million.

"Thousands of students are in portables and there's a terrific demand for space in schools," said Sherlock. "There's a tremendous backlog, and it's going to get worse."

He has suggested consulting with the education ministry and local teacher affiliates about using the pension funds. The funds could be funnelled through the province as mortgage money loaned at market rates, Sherlock suggested.

Sherlock's motion to ask the new education minister and the Ontario Teachers Pension Board to examine the idea, was unanimously approved by the board.
