Eden Mills will once again host the Eden Mills Writers' Festival on Sunday, September 10, noon to 6 p.m.

The festival is prepared for rain or shine, with both indoor and outdoor venues. This literary arts festival, with its open-air readings and relaxed country-fair ambiance, boasts an impressive line-up of 29 celebrated and up-and-coming writers from across Canada and the United States.

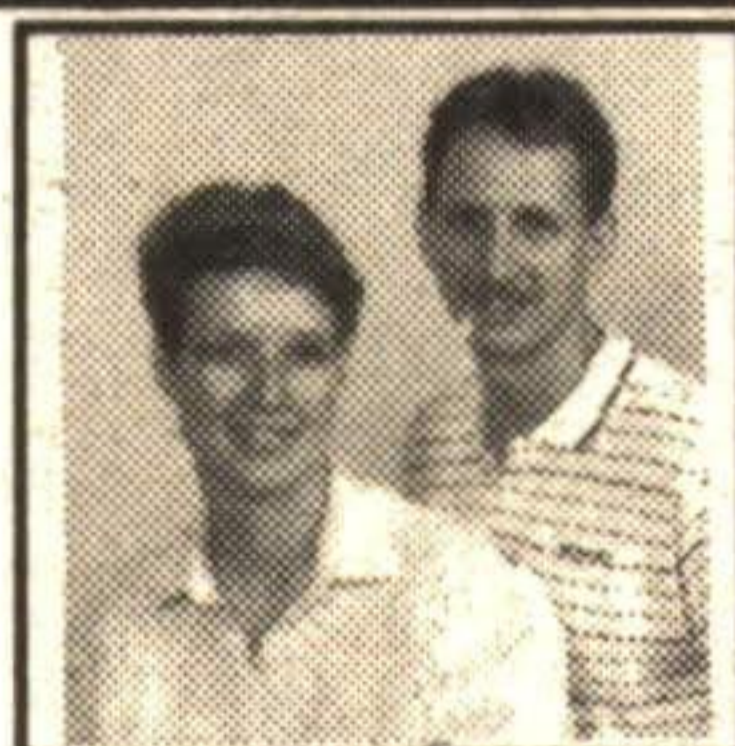
Now in its seventh year, the Eden Mills Writers' Festival is coordinated by a group of dedicated volunteers, including resident authors Leon and Constance Rooke, and Janice Kulyk Keefer. Last year 2,500 book lovers (almost eight times the village population) flocked to the festival from all over the area for this entertaining literary event.

WHITE GRUBS - THEIR BACK-AGAIN!!

Over the past 1-1/2 weeks, I have seen White Grubs beginning to emerge from their eggs. Especially in areas where there are a lot of trees. At this time of the year, if you notice any new brown spots in your lawn, then White Grubs may be the problem. These grubs are in the larvae of June Beetles and European Chafers. Beetles lay eggs which hatch in the summer. Damage is very noticeable in late August to September, especially when skunks and raccoons and moles dig up the lawn to feed on the grubs. In the dead patches, the weakly rooted sod can be pulled back to reveal the fat, white, C-shaped grubs. They have a brown head and three large pairs of legs.

As soon as treatment for White Grubs is applied, the damage will be controlled. In most cases, the damaged grass will recover with regular watering and fertilizing. However, some seeding may be needed. Ideally the application should be applied in the late summer or early fall, when the grubs are smallest and most susceptible. If the grubs are not controlled at this time, they will continue feeding on the grass roots in the spring. Therefore a spring application will be necessary. If you have White Grubs in your lawn, or any signs of them, then I would strongly recommend treating them as soon as possible.
