He has completed graduate studies in International Education, Clinical Psychology and Educational Administration. He has been a member of the Baha'i Faith for over 20 years.

Anti-Poverty Coalition sets date for first meeting

Starting October 1, most social assistance recipients will have their incomes cut by 22 per cent.

Thousands of people in Halton already live in poverty but now the situation will be even more critical for individuals and particularly families with children, according to the Halton Anti-Poverty Coalition.

In 1991, one out of every 17 children in Halton were considered poor (based on Statistics Canada Low-income Cutoffs).

In 1994, approximately 45 per cent of all food bank recipients were children.

Of the thousands of social assistance beneficiaries in Halton in 1995, approximately 42 per cent of general welfare recipients were children and approximately 57 per cent of Family Benefit Allowance recipients were children.

Children living in poverty are more prone to higher infant death

rates, low birth weights, childhood disability, higher school drop-out rates, unstable, stressful or violent family situations, psychiatric disorders, smoking, drugs and problems with alcohol.

Halton Social Planning Council invites the Halton community to attend the first meeting of the Halton Anti-Poverty Coalition. Particularly encouraged to attend are low income individuals and family members (child care and transportation arrangements can be requested.)
