About 73 per cent of Halton Hills commercial taxpayers will see a change of \$1,000 up or down on their tax bill, about 12 per cent will receive more than a \$1,000 reduction and slightly more than 13 per cent will pay more than an additional \$1,000 in taxes.

Industrial taxes will shift in town as well. About 68 per cent of industry will receive a change of plus or minus \$1,000 on their tax bill, 22 per cent will see a reduction of more than \$1,000 and 9.9 per cent are facing an increase of more than \$1,000.


Almost all (99.8 per cent) of apartment building and other multiresidential property owners will see a change of \$1,000 either way on their 1996 bills. Only 0.2 per cent are facing an increase of more than \$1,000 and none of them will receive a reduction of more than \$1,000.

Halton Hills taxpayers will receive their assessment notices in early November. Open houses will be held sometime between Nov. 20 and Dec. 1 in town so residents can discuss the details of their property tax with a tax assessor.

Appeals can be made until Jan. 9. Anyone interested in finding out how the reassessment will affect their tax bill should call the Regional Assessment Office at 1-800-387-5909, (905) 270-8050 or the town's treasury department at 873-2600.

DENTURIST **EARLY DENTURES**

We don't know how lucky we are today! It's hard to believe the "denture dilemma's" people were in back in the 1800's.



GREEN THUMB GARDENING

October is the month when colorful autumn scenes dominate the landscape. But, it is also the month that we should begin to clean up the yard and garden. Work done this fall will bring many rewards next spring.

Tender bulbs such as dahlia, gladiolus, and tuberous begonias should be lifted from the ground once the foliage is killed by frost. Dahlia stems should be cut to 6 inches long, while gladiolus and begonia leaves cut ton one or two inches. Place the bulbs on their side for two weeks to allow the moisture to escape. During this period shake or gently rub the soil off the bulbs. When the bulbs are dry (2 weeks) dust them with a fungicide to prevent dry rot and scab, then store in a cool dry, frost-free area for the winter.

Perennials that normally die down to the ground each winter can have their foliage pruned down. Also this is a good time to divide and replant overgrown clumps of achillea, astilbes, hosta and lily of the valley. To insulate perennials from severe cold weather, apply a light porous mulch (it has more insulative value) during late fall. Pine branches and needles, dry leaves and straw are all excellent mulches. Remove the mulch next spring. Once the foliage has dropped off of the rose bushes and fruit trees it should be collected and destroyed. If the leaves were diseased they could be a source for reinfection during the next season if not removed. However, do not prune rose bushes in the fall, that is best left until the spring.

Leaves from maples, oaks, lindens, chestnuts and other large leaved trees accumulate quickly and can smother the turf grass. These leaves should be raked and removed regularly.
