After turning in a solid effort in their season opener against Oakville on Saturday, losing 8-7 in overtime, the Raiders were not the same team against Mississauga two days later—at least not in the final two periods.

"It was a good game in the first period, it was back and forth" commented Russiani, reflecting on the events. "I don't know what happened."

The Raiders trailed 3-1 after 20 minutes but allowed the opposition five unanswered markers in the middle stanza to secure the win.

Russiani was unimpressed by the defensive game his squad played. "They were getting two and three passes in front of our net," claimed the general manager. "Once they found they could take the slot on us they killed us all night."

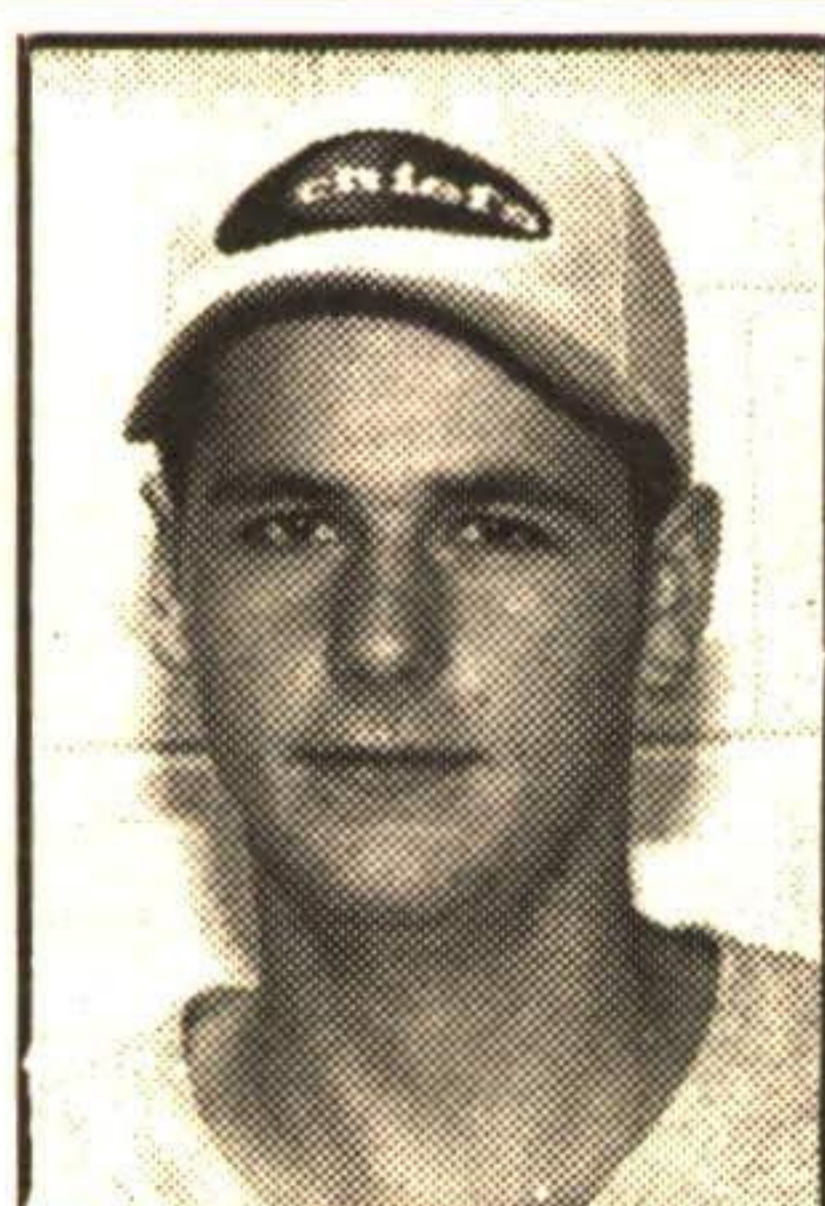

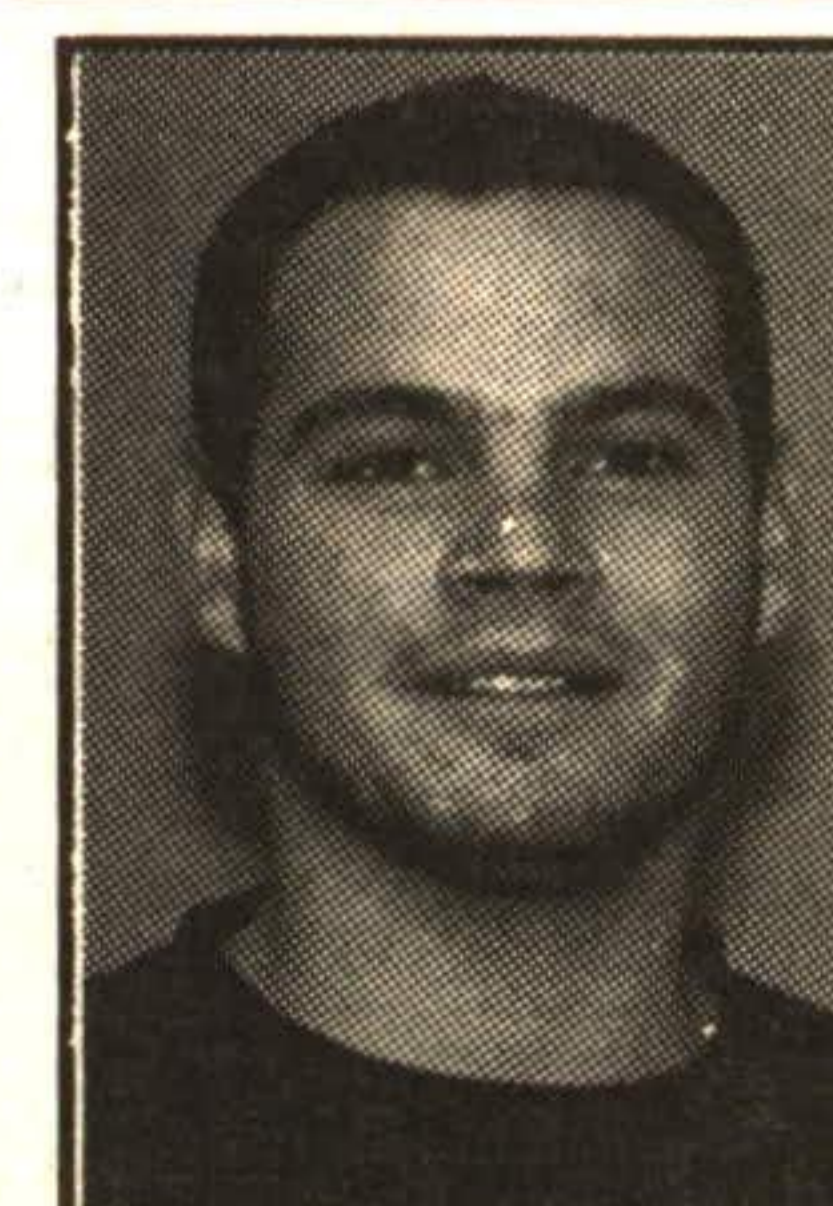
### Athletes of the Week
