tunes from the Hollywood days, tunes from happier days. We're even springin' new country music on him. He taps his feet or hands, cries to the sadder songs, laughs at our jokes, makes fun of my trials and tribulations (without speaking). Sometimes we'll remind him of happier or funnier times and although his brain and body has suffered trauma, we've touched the inner Ron, he laughs like the Ron we've laughed with before.

Ron enjoys visitors, he seems to recognize most people. Telling him who you are and of an occasion you've shared may trigger a memory, this helps him go on, helps him heal.

I truly believe that by visiting Ron makes him feel that he still belongs, still has reason to fight, to work. to benefit from tedious therapy, to beat depression.

So, we wish to extend an open invitation to all of Ron's friends, compadres and golfing buddies to join in our quest to get Ron back on track. Enjoying his friends, family, and life once again. 
