YOUR CHILD'S HEARING

Hearing is one of the basic ways we communicate. From early infancy, we begin to distinguish sounds and attach meanings. We learn our first words from hearing others speak.

Sometimes our hearing fails us. Hearing loss can happen to anyone, regardless of age. Occasionally children are born with hearing defects. During these early years hearing loss can be mistakenly diagnosed as A.D.D. (Attention Deficit Disorder). This learning disability usually poor accompanies participation in school and often low marks.

A.B.R. (Auditory Brainstem Response) is used to test infants hearing without participation from the child. It is an effective way of determining hearing loss for infants.
