## Region tackles the trash

While there have been a few glitches in the collection of trash in town since the beginning of the year, a region spokesperson said they should all be worked out by next week.

The region took over waste pickup in the town as of January 1, at a cost savings to the town of \$146,000, or 31

per cent per year.

Victor Lesnicki, manger of waste management services for Halton Region, said the pickup problems in town were due to the tremendous amount of material to be collected during the Christmas holidays and confusion about when the trash is to be out at the curb. As a result garbage trucks were sent out on a Saturday, which is unusual.

Lesnicki said last year's garbage pickup days, Tuesday through Friday, have been retained so whatever day a resident's trash was picked up last year it should be picked up now. That schedule should not be affected on long weekends.

Lesnicki said what may have changed for residents is the actual

pickup time.

"We ask that residents have their garbage at the curbside by 7 a.m.," said Lesnicki. He said Philips Environmental, contracted to pick up the trash for the next six years, should have all garbage collected by 6 p.m.


Recyclables are picked up by Laidlaw on garbage pickup day, as they were the year before.

"We appreciate the patience people have shown," said Lesnicki.


Lesnicki said minor changes for garbage and blue box collection may have to be made in the future.


