St. George's boldly goes on a Prayer Trek

About 100 children have enrolled in an innovative Prayer Trek program to be held at St. George's Anglican Church in Georgetown.

The program is being conducted over four Sundays from February 18 to March 10.

The program incorporates current active learning concepts to teach children about personal prayer and follows the exploratory theme of the Star Trek television series.

"The church hall is going to be transformed into the bridge of the Starship Eternity," said coordinator Merle Carlton. "We're setting up seven 'planetary' areas of the church."

The children, organized into 25 groups of four with an adult leader, will take turns visiting the planets of Faith, Hope and Love. They will begin their weekly voyage with song

and then a visit to the transformer room, where they will stand on heart-shaped transformer discs to be transported to the planets. Each planet area will be decorated differently to create a feeling of unexplored territory.

"Altering the physical setup of the church is going to create tremendous excitement for the children as they follow a mission into unknown space and seek guidance from 'Captain Companion'," Carlton continued.

Each child will be provided with an over-the-shoulder pouch which contains a personal log book to record prayer activities, situations and outcomes. They will also receive ageappropriate activity books which encourage the children to read Scripture and pray daily at home.

The program originated within the Niagara Diocese of the Anglican Church, of which St. George's is a parish. St. George's members, Merle Carlton, Richard Clague and Brenda Sisnet, heard about the program and attended training sessions last October. Richard Clague believes that the children will benefit from learning more about spontaneous prayer.

"In the Anglican tradition, our prayer books are based upon the thoughtful use of Scripture to form our prayers and corporate worship," he said. "Prayer Trek will show children the role Scripture plays in the development of prayer and will give them a positive experience of unrehearsed prayer with others."




