Acton blood donor clinic


Acton is hosting its quarterly Red Cross Blood Donor Clinic on Thursday, March

The business is Eagle Ottawa, formerly Blackhawk



Trustees consider tentative tax hike

The Halton Board of Education is curently looking at a \$286-million operating budget in 1996 - an increase of 1.38 per cent over last year's actual budget.

The \$286-million budget was presented to the board's finance committee March 4, one day before it issued layoff notice to 1,503 board employees.

However, the board notes \$286million budget is merely a starting point and that it incorporates the impact of the board's exit from the Social Contract as well as a major initiative in the areas of administrative and instructional technology.

Since the board's provincial grants have not been announced this year, it cannot predict how much the proposed spending increase would affect the mill rate.

In September, the finance committee received a budget forecast for 1996 which projected a mill rate increase of 4.5 per cent.

In January, the board passed a motion directing administration to prepare a report detailing the impact a 0 per cent mill rate increase.

Integral to this report is the 'provincial tool kit for education' which was released by the province last week. Administration will be reviewing the information in the kit in conjunction with the 1996 grants, once they are released, to prepare a report detailing proposed reductions.

The public is being invited to the board's finance committee deliberations, scheduled for March 25-27, 7:30 p.m. nightly, at the J. W. Singleton Education Centre on Guelph Line.
