An impressive record


Halton Hills town council and staff should be commended on achieving an impressive record—five consecutive years without increasing town taxes.

Now we can only hope that the public school board trustees who begin their budget deliberations next week, can follow the directions of a good teacher — Halton Hills council.



Gun registration threat to liberty

The following letter was filed with this newspaper for publication.

Dear fellow gun owners:
