Raiders allow Rangers to rally

Minor peewees lose opener

The Georgetown PDS minor peewee Raiders seemed poised to take an early lead in their Ontario Minor Hockey Association 'AA' final on Tuesday night at Gordon Alcott Arena.

Then the wheels — or skates in this case — seem to have fallen off.

The Raiders, who are visiting the OMHA final for the third straight season, where in high gear when the referee dropped the puck to open their best-of-five championship series with the Vaughan Rangers, but their success was shortlived as they allowed the Rangers to rally from a 3-0 first period deficit to claim a 4-3 victory.

The Raiders came out flying in the contest and needed only one minute and 13 seconds to record their first marker. Brad Snow found the top corner with help from Graham McCulloch and Ronny Larocque and the Raiders were in flight.

Mark Fantegrossi made it 2-0 for the Raiders three minutes later when he was in perfect position to tip home a pass from Kyle Hotham and Ryan Busby.

The Raiders didn't stop there! Ryan Busby split the defense and found the top corner to make it 3-0 with 7:52

gone in the opening period and it seemed like the rout was on.

A fourth match, if needed, will be played in Vaughan on Wednesday night with game five back at Alcott on Thursday at 7 p.m.

The Acton Atom II Sabres fell just a little short of their goal this week.

The Sabres were defeated by Grand Valley in the Tri-county league championships action, three games to one in the best-of-five affair.
