weren't on their game all night. They were largely ineffective in penetrating Milton's defense through the first and final periods and their overall physical play was well below par.


Starting netminder Cory Fearon was also pulled midway through the third, for the first time this season. Working the final leg of the game was rookie backup Brandon Miller.







