Thomsons get three months

Justice David S. Crane has sentenced Ken and Joan Thomson to three months in a correctional centre, to be served immediately.

The two were in Milton court Friday to be sentenced in relation to a fire which gutted their Young St. Acton home in January 1992. Their trial ended in February when a jury found them both guilty of arson with intent to defraud and arson endangering life.

After serving two-thirds of their sentence, the two are eligible for parole.

Doug Lent, the lawyer representing Ken Thomson, and Jack McCulligh, the

lawyer for Joan Thomson, both asked for a sentence of probation and community service for their clients. They pointed out strong family ties, no previous record and that the Thomsons have already suffered greatly.

However, Crown Attorney James Cornish noted that the life of a firefighter, Jim Endean, was endangered when he was sprayed with gasoline while fighting the fire. He told the judge that the actions of the Thomsons require a jail sentence of 15 months to two years less a day.


