Care III Misleading Care Labels

According to the Federal Trade Commission's Care Label Rule, to the lamost wearing apparel made tomen day must have a care label permanently affixed to the article. Unfortunately, many care labels give inaccurate or unclear instructions and continue to spot Clean Only structions and continue to spot Clean Only and the professional drycleaner ineff

You may not look at the care label until it is time to have your clothing cleaned, and then you are shocked at the true meaning of the care label. One of the more confusing labels reads: "Do not dryclean, do not wash, spot clean only."

The Care Label Rule clearly states that the instructions on the label must be followed, and anyone

who processes the garment contrary to the label is responsible for garment failure.

Wash will spot clean the garment successfully. Any spot cleaning procedure will be ineffective in removing underarm stains, cosmetics around the collar, and other general soil. Consequently, your drycleaner may be forced into the unfortunate predicament of telling you that they cannot clean the item.

away on vacation during the summer months and are not available to see notifications or attend public meetings.

It was also noted that members of Halton Hills Council didn't receive prior notice of the meeting because a consultant from the region neglected to provide notice to Halton Hills municipal staff for circulation to council members.

Costea told council at its July 13 meeting that regional staff balked at holding another public meeting because they had already held one and it had been "duly advertised". However, staff agreed to come to council on Monday to make a public presentation on expansion plans

for the plant.

Among regional staff expected to appear at the presentation will be Vince Suffoletta, Halton's manager of water plant operations. Councillor Marilyn Serjeantson, said in an interview three weeks ago that the water plants needs upgrading "to bring it up to provincial standards." Plans include the addition of a covered garage, showers and other amenities to the facility. Mayor Miller attempted to allay Rutherford's concerns about sufficient public input into the project by telling her at council's meeting two weeks ago that council will "represent the people" by asking questions during the regional pre-
