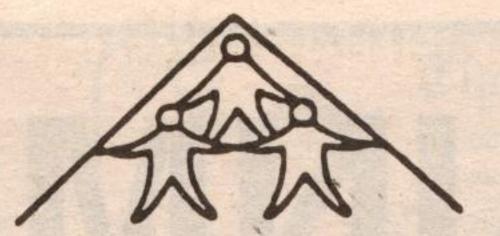

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## Lifeguards in competition

Life guards from the Town of Halton Hills will be participating is some healthy competition this weekend...literally.

Guards from pools in Georgetown and Acton will be in Orangeville Saturday competing against teams from Milton, Brampton, Caledon and Orangeville's public pools, testing their skills as guards.

Teams are evaluated in each of four categories, with judging based on an overall individual and team effort, a Recreation Department spokesperson explained.

Guards are tested on their abilities in relay races, preventability exercises, emergency situations, and priority assessment.

The priority assessment portion of the competition consists of four guards from one team being locked in a room while ten victims with varying degrees of injury are placed around the pool area. The guards have five minutes to assess and determine treatment for the injuries.

The guards are then expected to administer first aid and/or CPR to at least two victims in five minutes.

"The competition is a lot of fun, but it's a little stressful when you know something is going to happen," Nancy Gilchrist of the Acton Indoor Pool said.

The teams from Halton Hills have never won the competition, usually placing in the middle of the pack. Last year, Georgetown did not field a team.

This year, however, Georgetown are coaching themselves under the supervision of team captain Cara Buckley at the Georgetown Indoor Pool located at Georgetown District High School. Acton's team is coached by Joanne Bodnar, Gilchrist and team captain Andrew McVeigh.

The Acton team consists of McVeigh, Scott McKee, Heather Coxe, and Lana Jaremy.

The team from Georgetown is made up of Buckley, John Colton, Jenny Ryan and Suzanne Moore.



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
