

Police auction offers items galore

More than 200 items, including typewriters, golf clubs, cellular phones, car stereos, fishing rods, fire extinguishers, watches, rings, fog lamps and about 80 bicycles will be featured at next Friday's annual police auction in Georgetown.

There's even a 14-foot flagpole and some lawnchairs up for auction at the event, which will begin at 6:30 p.m. at the Gordon Alcott Memorial Arena. Viewing of the items will begin at 5:30 p.m.

John Horning, clerk for One District, Halton Regional Police, said the items come from police headquarters in Georgetown and Milton.

They represent unclaimed articles turned over to or recovered by police.

Lou Smith will be auctioneer, with all proceeds of the sale being put into the police budget.

Acton youth charged

A 17-year-old Acton youth has been charged with theft under \$1,000 after a Norco bicycle was taken from a driveway on Storey Drive, Acton.

According to Halton Regional Police, a 14-year-old youth was followed by five other youths as he rode his bicycle home. He parked the bike on the driveway at a residence and went inside.

A "few moments after (he) observed the bicycle being ridden away" by one of the youths who had followed him. Police said the bike was stripped of its parts "which were distributed among the youths."

Police investigated the theft and the 17-year-old was later charged. Police are planning to speak to the other suspects. The youth appears in Milton court. The bike was worth about \$400.

Man attacked?

Halton Regional Police are continuing their investigation after an 18-year-old Georgetown man was

apparently "jumped" in a downtown Georgetown alley.

According to police, the man and a friend were travelling through the alley when the victim was jumped by an unknown assailant, pushed to the ground and was punched. Twenty other people prevented the man's friend from helping him.

But further police investigation has revealed the victim may have in fact jumped out of a van and approached someone in the alley, confronted the man and then started the fight.

The fight was eventually broken up after a witness threatened to call police.

Whites for all Seasons

Gone are the "rules" of fashion that say white is strictly a "summer" color. Designers have been including white in their fall and winter lines for some years now, and this year, white is bigger and brighter.

Years ago, people dried their whites in the sun to "bleach" them to a pristine white color. That is probably the worst thing you can do to your treasured whites. Light, whether sunlight or artificial, may "yellow" your whites



because white fabrics are usually treated with optical brighteners which break down in light. Once the brightener has decomposed, most often it is not possible to restore the garment to its original condition.
