Review committee to study quarry

Environmentally Sensitive Areas (ESAs), and an important source of groundwater for both the Town of Milton and the Town of Halton Hills, I am pleased to announce that I have initiated a special review committee to ensure compliance (of the quarry) with the relevant provincial statutes," Duignan told those attending the media conference.

Grier has approved the committee's formation, in principle, and it's expected to be operational within three weeks. Mayor Miller said representation will include the towns of Halton Hills and Milton, the Credit Valley Conservation Authority, Halton Region Conservation Authority, and three local environmental interest groups, Water and Protect Our Environmental Resources (POWER), Furiously Opposed to Acton Dumping (FOAD) and Ecology Awareness Group Landscape and Environment (EAGLE).

The committee will work closely with the quarry operator and the Ministries of Environment and Natural Resources. Its purpose is to guarantee sound environmental

planning and reduced environmental impacts in connection with the quarry operation.

"The Minister of the Environment has a number of concerns with the operation of the quarry and has brought them to the attention of the Minister of Natural Resources (Bud Wildman), and has created an opportunity for a monitoring and compliance function that can be serviced by this committee," Duignan explained.

At present, the Acton Quarry pumps out 1.8 million gallons of water daily, diverting the water supply from one Conservation Authority area to another. The water is removed from the Milton watershed, administered by the Halton Region Conservation Authority, and pumped over the escarpment. Some is used for quarry processing, but only 20 per cent finds its way into Black Creek, regulated by the Credit Valley Conservation Authority. The Black Creek buried valley is a major source of Georgetown's drinking water.

Halton Region relies on the ground and surface flows east of the quarry to service the urban areas of Acton and Georgetown.

"At the moment, development is frozen in both areas, and millions of dollars are at stake if the sewage and water allotments cannot be made to support the commitments that are being made for housing and industry in Halton Hills," Duignan

Mayor Miller said he hopes the committee will have effective input into regulations contained in the quarry's site plan. "Maybe some negotiation can take place," he speculated. "The Town has had difficulty in seeing site plans (for the quarry), "he said, indicating his hope that the new committee will open channels of communication and ensure protection of the Town's groundwater source.


