
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

Police chase men onto train tracks

Halton Regional Police called in a canine unit to help catch a pair of suspects early Monday morning after a short car and foot chase ended at the Go Transit yard on Queen Street, Georgetown.

An 11 Division officer was

parked at the intersection of River Road and Mountainview Road at about 2:53 a.m. when he noticed a van with two males sitting inside, a police report said.

The officer suspected the van may have been connected with a recent series of break-ins at loc variety stores.

According to the report, the off cer began to follow the van alon Mountainview Road to King Street and when he got close enough t stop the vehicle, activated his roo lights.

The van accelerated westboun on King Street and when it got t Queen Street, turned into th Georgetown Train Station parkin

The van then travelled eastboun along the railroad tracks until came to rest at the Canadia National Railroad maintainanc buildings.

When the van stopped, two me jumped out. The passenger ran east bound along the tracks. The drive ran north, jumped a large fence and was running toward River Stree when the officer last saw him.

Meanwhile, other police officer began to arrive in the area and " perimeter area was set-up," the report said. The passenger from the van was caught by one of the offi cers on the perimeter.

Polie then called in the Canine Unit and the second suspect was captured a short time later.

Further investigation revealed that the van had been stolen from Color Your World in Toronto and contained evidence believed connected with several other incidence.

Two men — one a 23-year-old Georgetown resident, the other a 24-year-old Toronto man - have been charged with possession of stolen property. They were set to appear for a bail hearing Tuesday.
