It was my plan. Of course, the look of disbelief on my co-worker's face said otherwise.


I like to think of it as effective planning.

"Good, cuz I'm going upstairs to get ready for work. Can I get a ride to work after my shower?"


"Shower? Ah, you may have to wait a bit. You know, the water's gotta heat up first."


