

## Service cuts or tax hikes coming—region

Financial pressures will force Halton Region to make dramatic cuts to programs or significantly raise taxes, according to acting chief administrative officer Joe Rinaldo.

To maintain the status quo, the tax and utility rate hike to a typical homeowner for 1997 is expected to total an extra \$48.66—6.4 per cent. That does not include education levies, which make up about 60 per cent of the property tax bill.

"You can only take so much in the way of provincial downloading before pressures become too great," said Rinaldo. "We are going to go through this gut-wrenching process. There may be a reduction in services or the elimination of programs."

Wednesday the budget review committee heard that further provincial funding cuts, slower than anticipated assessment growth and crumbling pipes and roads have combined to bring Halton's budget to the breaking point.

The total tax and rate jump to Halton residents could easily top the 6.4 per cent predicted by

regional staff. That number assumes a relatively lengthy period of 10 years for refitting old cast iron watermains across the region.

Halton's predicament was laid bare when Rinaldo admitted to Burlington councillor Rob MacIssac that the region's proposed budget policies were not adequate to sustain Halton's infrastructure. Moments later senior policy budget co-ordinator Robert Rossini told committee that Halton could not borrow money for infrastructure because it has reached the debt ceiling allowed by provincial law.

"There are hard decisions and

choices to be made by council," said Rinaldo. "It may mean a reduction in services or an increase in taxes."

Rinaldo said Halton's debt load was "reasonable." He called the region's ability to move from about \$19 million in provincial funding to \$6 million, "a real achievement" but acknowledged further cuts could not be absorbed as easily.

Regional Chair Joyce Savoline suggested the various components of Halton's tax bill be classified for taxpayers, so they will know how much they pay for each service and which areas are increasing taxes.
