Run for Terry

Today, hundreds of thousands of people across Canada will be taking part in annual Terry Fox runs.

The runs have become a uniquely Canadian institution since Fox captured the attention of the entire nation with his 1980 Marathon of Hope. While cancer did eventually win its battle with the one-legged B.C. runner, the legacy he left behind is nothing short of outstanding.

Millions of dollars have been raised in the past 15 years through Terry Fox Runs and the amount of money raised locally—particularly in Acton—has

been phenomenal.

Last year, the Acton run brought in a little more than \$25,000 and since 1981 almost \$273,000 has been raised. Unfortunately, the same support has not been seen in Georgetown where less than \$7,000 was raised last year and only \$48,000 since 1981.

In fact, the Georgetown event seemed doomed this year until local resident Bonnie Covert stepped forward to volunteer to organize the run. Covert knows all too well the horrors of cancer as she lost her brother to the dreaded disease last month.

"My brother was inspired by Terry Fox," said Covert.

We tip our cap to Ms. Covert and all participants who have made the effort to ensure that Terry Fox's dream lives on.
