Pool dispute leaves local swim teams dry-docked

The two local high schools have been left high and dry by pool L negotiations between the school board and the town.

Georgetown District High School and Acton High School students will remain locked out of the indoor pools until a settlement is reached. The Halton Board of Education reopened negotiations on the pool agreement in August, hoping to arrange a deal to either lower or eliminate

its operating costs.

board the Gerry Cullen, superintendent of facility services, said negotiations are complicated by the fact the board is dealing with three different municipalities. He said talks are progressing as planned and he hopes for a settlement by the end of October and final approval by mid-November.

In the meantime, students will not have use of the pool. Both the Redmen and Rebel swimming programs have been put on hold and classes have not been scheduled for the pool.

"It would be a shame if the kids

couldn't swim," said Jim Hall, director of athletics at GDHS. "We have 850 kids not allowed in the pool. To me, it's a valuable part of the curriculum. Hopefully the board and the town can get together and resolve this quickly."

User fees are a possible solution but Bruce Andrews, director of athletics at Acton, said if the responsibility is put on the students to pay, the school team will not compete.

"If it becomes user fees I can't see it happening," Andrews said. "With practices three or four times per week, it would just be too expensive."

Hall said if a deal was reached by the end of October, the swim teams would l able to compete.

The original agreement between the town and the school board was that the town would pay for the construction the pools on school property while the school board would pay for the maintenance for the life of the pool.

The board is hoping to save \$320,000 1996 and \$800,000 over the entire scho year.

The negotiations affect seven publ pools in Halton, including five Burlington and Oakville.

The Rebels didn't have much time to make any adjustments either. They had only two days to practice before taking on Oakville-Trafalgar Friday (Sept. 20) afternoon.


