The Redmen fell behind by 10 points before rallying for the victory. Middle blocker Jeff Birrell played an excellent two-way game. Setter Andy Kilmer rallied the team,

serving a number of rallies that ended in Redmen points.

Two days later there were no comebacks against E.C. Drury. The team came out flat and struggled with its service reception. Ellis said both the team's offensive and defensive system broke down because of erratic passing and tentative hitting. The team also lacked covering on both the attack


