

Kristin Finley and Darya Barbir each had eight, Maya Barbir and Rebecca Austin had seven apiece. Jenn Schultz and Kristie Goy contributed six points each and Stephanie McKay had four.

"We panicked a little early but we showed we can play with them in the second quarter," McLaren said.

The senior squad dropped a 58-35 decision to Pearson. Kelly Holmes led the Redmen with 15 points, including seven in the final quarter. Jackie Jahn finished with six points and Stephanie Adams and Eleni Halis each had four.

"Our shooting still isn't where it should be," said senior coach Anne Andrews. "We're executing the plays now but we're not making the shots."




