Public's input sought on the future of Prospect Park in Acton

A cton residents will have an opportunity to unleash their creativity and participate in a public workshop on Wednesday, Nov. 13 to consider future prospects for Prospect Park.

The relocation of the arena to Acton East allows the town to consider future changes to the design and function of Prospect Park.

Community groups, agencies

and the public are invited to attend an informal workshop to lend their vision for the "ideal Prospect" and recreational use of Fairy Lake.

The workshop, sponsored by the Recreation and Parks Department, will have participants gather in small groups and consider the current park site, background issues and inspirations from elsewhere to generate visions for the park.

They'll then roll up their sleeves with park maps, glue, photos, markers and landscape design tools to create images of a new Prospect Park.

A b a c k g r o u n d presentation at the outset of the workshop will provide a brief review of the history of the park, including its role in servicing the whole community as a major public resource. Current facilities and

uses will be reviewed, including the operational requirements of major special events, such as the fall fair.

People will have a chance to consider the merits of some proposals for the park, including one by the Acton Agricultural Society to build an operate a large structure on the site of the existing arena.
