Plan for Gardens lands finalized *

I alton Hills council has given the thumbs up to a master plan concept of the Dominion Gardens lands which will include a park, a Catholic high school, a fire station, a retail section, and townhomes and apartments.

The stamp of approval was given at a special council meeting held Thursday evening. Parallax Land Corp., the developer, wanted council approval on the concept before yesterday (Saturday), since that's when the option to buy the lands from the Harding family ran out.

All councillors present agreed to the proposed concept, except Esquesing Councillor Kevin Kuiack who argued that the process had been rushed and there had not been enough community input.

However, Mayor Marilyn Serjeantson said, "The public process we've just been through, has been more thorough in the sense the public has been involved in the actually planning... and that's a real first. We've never had the workshops before.... It may not have been a long, drawn out affair, but it was done in a way that ... I do believe the public who wanted to be part of it actually came and sat down with pen in hand and worked at it....I think we have achieved something we can be proud of."

In a recorded vote, Georgetown Councillors Al Cook and Ron Chatten were the only ones to object to locating a future fire station on the site. The more centrally-located station fronting onto Mountainview Rd., would serve Halton Hills' future fire service needs— improving response times, for example, Fire Chief Bill Cunningham said.

The Guelph St./Maple Ave. corner will be approximately eight acres of parkland, including a memorial gardens commemorating the Dominion Seed House's historical contribution the town.

The high school will be on 15 acres of land or less, fronting onto Guelph St. and with access off Mountainview Rd. as well. Some councillors suggested the building could be three storeys to
