MPPs, trustees discuss reform?

Talton Board of Education's chair said a meeting with the region's four La La Tory MPPs provided no new information and gave trustees no reason to think they can't proceed with their plans for renewal.

"I didn't really see anything that would say you can't close schools now or would prevent the reduction of administration staff," Linda Glover said of the discussion she, other trustees and senior board administration had Monday.

The two-hour, tete-a-tete at the board offices in Burlington had been requested in late November by MPPs Ted Chudleigh, Cam Jackson, Terence Young and Gary Carr.

The gathering was prompted by statements from some trustees that the board has not been given ample direction about the kind and size of educational reforms coming to Ontario and their impact on students and school boards.

Glover said rumors about the changes have circulated for months.

"I know I didn't get any clear direction. They're going to have (funding) cuts," she said of the education ministry, "and they're looking at the Who Does What Panel on the direction of school boards. It's all the things we've heard before."

In a Thursday press release, Halton North MPP Ted Chudleigh said the first piece of legislation will be introduced next week, and subsequent bills will be introduced early in 1997. A special winter session, called the Who Does What session, will be held to focus on the restructuring of municipalities and school boards, with all changes in place for 1998.

Commenting on the meeting with the school board, Chudleigh said the MPPs stressed the importance of making decisions that will complement the provincial reforms and that it was important to co-operate with municipalities in the future use and maintenance of schools.

Glover said one thing both sides agreed on during the meeting was to meet on a more regular basis.
